

## JIM MURRAY'S WHISKY BIBLE 2017 WINNERS

Jim Murray has once again lent his palate to the whisk(e)y category, naming what he deems to be the finest expressions in the world – *SB* presents the spirits claiming the top spots in the *Whisky Bible 2017*.

Jim Murray has released the latest edition of his *Whisky Bible*

Murray revealed the top ranking whiskies in his *Whisky Bible 2017*, published yesterday.

Assessing thousands of whiskies across all categories each year, Murray lists detailed tasting notes of each and offers a score. However, the accolade most anticipated each year is that of the World Whisky of the Year.

Since the book's launch in 2004, Murray has given the coveted title to Canadian whisky [Crown Royal Northern Harvest Rye in his 2015 edition](#) and a [Japanese whisky Yamazaki Sherry Cask in the Whisky Bible 2014](#).

### WILLIAM LARUE WELLER BOURBON

Claiming third place in the coveted World's Best Whisky 2017 is US tippie William Larue Weller Bourbon. According to the Buffalo Trace Distillery, pioneer W.L. Weller was the first distiller to produce Kentucky Straight Bourbon Whiskey using wheat instead of rye in the mash bill. His company went on to merge with Pappy Van Winkle's A. Ph. Stitzel Distillery to form the Stitzel-Weller Distillery, becoming renowned for such brands as W.L. Weller, Old Fitzgerald, Rebel Yell and Cabin Still. His legacy lives on with this namesake expression, which boasts notes of baked cinnamon, vanilla, and hints of orange citrus.

### GLEN GRANT AGED 18 YEARS RARE EDITION

In second place is Glen Grant Aged 18 Years Rare Edition, the first Scotch on the *Whisky Bible* podium since 2014. The Speyside malt blew away Murray as he tested 1,241 new samples for the latest edition of his influential guidebook. He said: "It's the best new offering from the motherland in a few years; a sensational return to form. It is a 43% volume dram; unleashed at 46%, non-chill-filtered, and Scotland might well be champion again."

### BOOKER'S RYE 13 YEAR OLD

Claiming the top accolade was Booker's Rye 13 Year Old, praised on its "brain-draining, mind-blowing" nose and finish of "amazing depth". Murray hails it as a "staggering example of a magnificent rye, showing exactly what genius actually means. A very big, unforgettable whiskey from a very big, unforgettable man". The Booker's Rye began life as an experiment by Booker Noe, grandson of Jim Beam, shortly before his death in 2004, and scored 97.5 out of 100 in the *Whisky Bible*.



### Whisky worth up to £14,000 has been stolen from the Tullibardine distillery shop - <http://www.thespiritsbusiness.com/>

The burglary took place over the weekend at the Tullibardine Distillery on Blackford, between Perth and Stirling.

In addition to the "rare" expression, the thief made off with another seven bottles, bringing the total value of the haul to £14,000 (about US\$18,000).

Police Scotland want to trace a man seen walking along the nearby A9 road with two bags around 21.55 on Saturday.

The man was described as between 25 and 35-years old, of medium build, and dressed in a red top, light coloured shorts and worker boots.

"Anyone who saw this man or anyone who has information that could assist officers with their enquiries is asked to contact Police Scotland on 101," a police spokesperson told [The Herald Scotland](#).

“Alternatively, information can be passed anonymously to the charity Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111.”

## TOP 10 BIGGEST SPIRITS HEISTS

The spirits industry has long-been blighted by criminal gangs which seek to gain from stealing and selling hoards of valuable expressions across the sector.

From rare pre-Prohibition whiskey to US\$1.1m worth of vodka, these are 10 of the biggest spirits heists

Such syndicates seem to have grown in prevalence over recent years as whisky and Cognac gain in value, and brands become more internationally available.

One of the most high profile spirits thefts reached its dramatic denouement last month when nine people were charged for their alleged involvement in a long-running Bourbon crime racket.

In 2013, one caretaker was accused of drinking an incredible US\$100,000 worth of rare pre-Prohibition whiskey, while a cunning gang made away with more than one million dollars worth of high-end vodka.

Here are the 10 of the biggest spirits heists in recent years.

### AMERICAN AIRLINES MINIATURES - US\$10,000 (£6,572)

Just last month, an airport cleaner was arrested for allegedly pilfering more than 1,400 miniature bottles of spirits worth US\$10,000 from American Airlines over a three-year period. The bottles – which carry an average RRP of US\$7.00 – were discovered by a member of airport security at Juanette Cullum's home. The case is ongoing but Cullum faces up to seven years in prison if found guilty.

### GLENGLOSSAUGH DISTILLERY - £10,000

An “unusual” theft occurred in June last year when more than £10,000 worth of rare Glenglossaugh Scotch whisky was stolen from the distillery's visitors' centre during a raid. Among the stolen lots, taken when the centre was closed, were rare bottles of 37-year-old and 40-year-old Glenglossaugh whiskies, worth £372 and £1,200 respectively.

### RARE BALVENIE BOTTLE - CA\$50,000 (£21,195)

The Balvenie fans lamented the loss of the last remaining bottle of David Stewart's The Balvenie Fifty in Canada, which was stolen from a liquor store in Montreal, Canada earlier this year. The rare expression, worth CA\$50,000, was launched to commemorate malt master Stewart's 50<sup>th</sup> birthday and was one of only 88 created. Local press reported that a thief entered a government-run liquor store “possibly armed” with a handgun.

### YEBA BUENA BEVERAGE - US\$70,000 (£46,000)

Yeba Buena Beverage, which distils and distributes spirits, reported that US\$70,000 worth of Cognac had been stolen from its storage area in February last year. Employees discovered that nine out of 84 cases of Cognac were missing during a routine stock inventory, while a hole in the fence was found next to the area authorities believe the stocks were lifted.

### DIAGEO UK HAULAGE SITE - £70,000

Diageo was targeted by thieves in 2013 when more than £70,000 worth of its spirits brands was lifted from a UK haulage site, where they were awaiting transport to Manchester Airport. The culprits entered a small family-run yard in the village of Tewitfield, near Lancaster, and lifted 1,314 bottles of Gordon's gin, 912 bottles and 120 half bottles of Baileys Irish Cream, 744 bottles of Bell's Original Whiskey and 540 bottles of Smirnoff Blue Vodka.

### RARE PRE-PROHIBITION WHISKEY - US\$100,000 (£65,731)

In March 2013 the former caretaker of a mansion in Pennsylvania was charged with drinking more than 50 bottles of antique, pre-Prohibition whiskey belonging to his employer, together worth US\$100,000. John Saunders' DNA was found on three of the bottles, but he denied the charges. The case then came to an abrupt end when he died at the age of 63.

### PAPPY VAN WINKLE AND WILD TURKEY - US\$100,000 (£65,731)

One of the most high profile cases of spirits theft in recent years culminated in the indictment of nine people in Kentucky last month. After a lengthy investigation by Kentucky police, a criminal syndicate – led by Buffalo Trace worker Gilbert Thomas Curtsinger – has been accused of orchestrated the high profile thefts of Wild Turkey and Pappy Van Winkle Bourbon.

In March this year, US\$30,000 worth of Bourbon was discovered in the backyard of Curtsinger, which police subsequently connected to the theft of US\$26,000 worth of rare Pappy Van Winkle Family Reserve Bourbon in 2013. Two members of the ring have pleaded guilty, but the case is on-going.

### CURRIE EUROPEAN TRANSPORT - £250,000

In December 2013, a “daring” thief made away with an entire trailer containing £250,000 worth of spirits from Currie European Transport site in Scotland. Around 2,400 cases of spirits were stolen, the majority of which contained Glen's vodka along with some cases of brandy, whisky and gin. The trailer has not yet been recovered, nor have any arrests been made.

### SYDNEY DISTRIBUTION CENTRE - AU\$700,000 (£366,000)

Police were left flabbergasted after more than AU\$700,000 worth of alcohol, predominantly vodka, Scotch and rum, was stolen from a Sydney distribution centre over the course of six months in 2013. Detectives believed the thefts were carried out over 13 separate occasions at the product distribution centre in Eastern Creek, West Sydney. Two men were later charged in the case.

### SPIRITS OF THE TSARS GOLDEN VODKA US\$1.1m (£723,000)

The most costly heist to have blighted the spirits industry in recent years when a gang of thieves made off with 752 cases of Spirits of the Tsars Golden Vodka worth US\$1.1m in 2013. The Ukrainian-made vodka that features 24-carat gold on its label retails for between US\$250 in the off-trade and \$1,200 in the on-trade. A group of men caught on CCTV leaving a customs warehouse in Miami several times over the course of five hours in three different vehicles having punched a hole in the wall directly to the area the vodka was stored.

### HUNTER LAING'S ISLAY DISTILLERY GETS APPROVAL

Scotch blender and bottler Hunter Laing & Co has been given the go-ahead to build an £8 million malt whisky distillery on Islay – the island's first new distillery in more than 10 years.

Hunter Laing & Co revealed its intention to move into distilling for the first time in January this year, but Argyll and Bute Council has now formally approved the planning application.

The Glasgow-based company – run by Andrew and Scott Laing, along with their father, Stewart – expects to commence work on building Ardnahoe distillery in November and start production in early 2018.

The distillery will be based at Ardnahoe on the north east coast of Islay, near Port Askaig, and will focus on single malt whisky production. Using water from the nearby Ardnahoe Loch, the site will produce around 200,000 litres of alcohol in its first year of operation.

“We are absolutely delighted that our plans for Ardnahoe have been approved,” said Andrew Laing. “Since starting our company, we've seen a huge demand for Islay whisky around the world and now is the perfect time to make the progression from blenders and bottlers to distillers and secure our own supply of Islay single malt.”

Scott Laing added: “Our father spent time on Islay early in his career while working for a brief spell at Bruichladdich. He has always had a natural affinity with the island and we're all fans of the peaty style of whisky it is renowned for so it's wonderful to be able to build a distillery on the island.”

The area of land on which the distillery will be based was previously owned by Islay Estates, but deeds transferred to Hunter Laing once planning was approved.

The distillery will be built in two phases. The first will see the establishment of distilling operations, warehousing and a visitor centre comprising of a café, tasting room and shop. The second will see an expansion of distilling operations and further warehousing.

Plans for the site also include a café, tasting room and shop.

Due to delays in the construction of a distillery at Gartbreck, Hunter Laing said it is set to open Islay's ninth distillery – the island's first in more than a decade since the completion of Kilchoman.

Hunter Laing was created in 2013 following the demerger of Douglas Laing & Sons. Stewart Laing's brother Fred runs fellow bottler and blender Douglas Laing & Co.

## Chocolate Waffles with Whiskey Butter Sauce

Ingredients

### For the Waffles:

- 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup unsweetened cocoa powder
- 1/4 cup granulated sugar
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. baking soda
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 2 cups milk
- 1 tsp. pure vanilla extract
- 2 large eggs
- 4 Tbsp. butter, melted and cooled
- 1/2 cup chocolate chips
- chopped walnuts, optional



### For the Sauce:

- 4 Tbsp. butter
- 1/3 cup brown sugar
- 1 tsp. pure vanilla extract
- pinch of salt
- 1/2 cup half and half
- 1 large egg
- 1/4 cup whiskey

### Instructions

#### To Make the Waffle Batter:

- In a large bowl, whisk together flour, cocoa powder, sugar, baking powder, baking soda, and salt.
- In another bowl, whisk together milk, vanilla, and eggs until frothy. Pour mixture into dry ingredients and whisk to mix. Let rest for about 15 minutes.

#### To Make the Whiskey Butter Sauce:

- In a small saucepan, whisk together butter, sugar, vanilla, and salt over low heat, until butter is melted and sugar has dissolved.
- Whisk together half and half and egg in a separate bowl, then pour into butter and sugar mixture in a slow stream, whisking the entire time.
- Cook, whisking continuously, for about 5 minutes, until mixture has thickened but is still very pourable.
- Remove from heat and whisk in whiskey. Set aside until ready to use.

#### To Make the Waffles:

- Preheat your waffle maker to desired settings. Stir melted butter and chocolate chips into waffle batter until butter is incorporated.
- Once the waffle maker is hot, pour approximately 1/3 cup of batter into the wells, close, and cook waffle. Repeat until all batter is used.
- Serve waffles with whiskey butter sauce. Top with chopped walnuts, if you like.

- Unless otherwise stated accommodation at the dinner will be guaranteed for all members who respond by Friday September 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2016 @ 6pm.

## Cancellation policy

- Using the same example as above, anyone who cancels anytime prior to Friday September 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2016 @ 6pm will be removed from the list.
