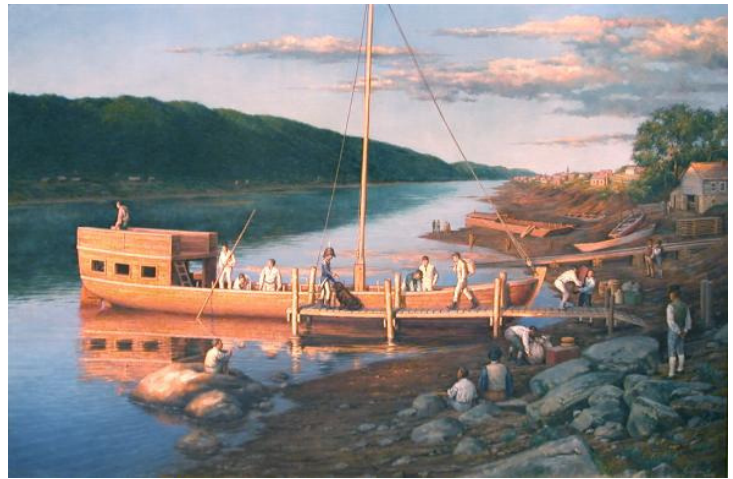


Lewis & Clark Expedition
